

CAMP OYO FACILITIES

All facilities must be left clean and neat after use. Units, groups, and individuals are responsible for their own conduct and are responsible for restitution for any damages caused. All injuries must be reported to Camp Leadership. Please notify the Camp Operations Director of any repairs needed or other facility requests by completing a Work Order.

Dining Hall and Kitchen

The dining hall at Camp Oyo is a multi-use facility, capable of accommodating up to 200 persons per meal. The dining hall is available for use year-round. Units or groups wishing to use the dining hall may do so for an additional fee. Sleeping in areas where food is served is not permitted under state law.

The use of the Dining Hall's kitchen equipment is reserved for those events that have specifically rented out the kitchen. Use of the kitchen is contingent upon being briefed by Camp Leadership concerning the proper use of the equipment. When using the kitchen great care should be taken to follow all safe kitchen practices.

Shower House

Warm water showers and flush toilets are located in the shower house at the pool year round. Separate facilities are provided for men, women and girls, and boys. The posted labels of the various rooms may be changed to accommodate specific needs, but this must be pre-approved by Camp Leadership in consultation with all groups in camp. Sleeping is not permitted in the shower house.

Restrooms

Boyd Lodge. There are restrooms in the Boyd Lodge for men and women. Latrines are located outside for youth. Youth campers are asked not to use the adult restrooms located in the Lodge.

Latrines or restroom facilities are also located adjacent to each of the established campsites.

Boyd Lodge

Boyd Lodge is to be used primarily for Adult training and/or adult meetings. Youth use of this building is prohibited, without the permission of Camp Leadership (some acceptable reasons would be a staff training event that involves youth or an OA function). A group director may use the building as a group headquarters.

This building also house's the Camp Office (Camp Operations Director) and traffic to and from that office should be expected. Groups may not use this office for group functions without the express permission of the Camp Operations Director.

The basement also serves as a tornado shelter for the camp. Storage of any type in the basement must be cleared by the Camp Operations Director. Unauthorized items stored in the basement may be removed/thrown out.

Boyd Lodge is a non-sleeping cabin.

Order of the Arrow Tower

Use and entrance is restricted to Order of the Arrow members. It may be used for other purposes with Camp Operations Director's permission and supervision only.

The OA Tower is a non-sleeping cabin.

Sleeping Areas

Cabins for Sleeping

When using a cabin, make sure that you leave it cleaner than when you found it. At check in time, make sure that the Campmaster or event director (or their designee) has checked that the smoke detectors and carbon monoxide detectors are in working order. Tacks, staples, nails, screws, etc. are prohibited from being placed into any wall or door of a cabin. Removable tape (painters tape) may be used for the hanging of work rosters, fireguard charts, etc. The following list is of sleeping cabins at Camp Oyo. (Occupancy load based upon BSA National Camp Standards. "Each Camper is provided with a minimum of 30 square feet of sheltered space for sleeping and storing personal gear.")

- Blockhouse Top: The occupancy number for this location is limited to 12.
- Blockhouse Bottom: The occupancy number for this location is limited to 10.
- The Cave: The occupancy number for this location is limited to 11.

- ❑ Clark: The occupancy number for this location is limited to 15.
- ❑ The Cook's Cabin: Left wing occupancy is 7. Right wing occupancy is 5.
- ❑ Dan Beard: Upstairs occupancy is 8. Left room 4. Right room 4. Entrance room 10.
- ❑ Lange Lodge. This cabin has a small kitchen. Left wing 19. Right wing 19.
- ❑ Lewis: The occupancy number for this location is limited to 15.
- ❑ Simon Kenton: The occupancy number for this location is limited to 15.
- ❑ Wagner Lodge: Entrance room occupancy is 33. Left wing 7. Right wing 7. Sleeping is prohibited on the upper level of this cabin.

Buildings with Limited Sleeping

The following is a list of cabins that allow sleeping with strict restrictions.

- ❑ Miller Health Lodge: Occupancy is restricted at two. Group directors may designate someone to serve as health officer and may allow them to sleep in the lodge.
- ❑ The Campmaster Cabin: Occupancy is recommended at four and may not exceed six. This is reserved for the Campmaster or group director or the group director's designee. This cabin has a small kitchen.

Buildings with No Sleeping

The following is a list of cabins in which sleeping is prohibited.

- ❑ Boyd Lodge. This lodge has a small kitchen.
- ❑ The Dining Hall
- ❑ The OA Tower
- ❑ The Pool Office
- ❑ The Shower House
- ❑ The Trading Post
- ❑ Any Buildings or Shelters in the Maintenance Area

Tent Sites

Camp Oyo offers 5 tent camping sites.

- ❑ Iroquois
- ❑ Lakeview East
- ❑ Lakeview West
- ❑ Lower Mingo
- ❑ Upper Mingo

Overflow Tent Sites

In the event that additional tent sites are needed the group director should contact the Camp Operations Director at least 48 hours in advance of the event to secure overflow camping sites. These include but are not limited too.

- ❑ The Ball Field
- ❑ North Field
- ❑ The Archery Range

The Trading Post

Access to this building is restricted to Camp Leadership or their designee only. As the trading post is in operation all year round, check with Camp Leadership for store hours.

If a group wishes to operate its own trading post/snack bar, then the group director needs to coordinate with Camp Leadership to eliminate overlap. This will help to benefit both trading posts.

Sleeping is not permitted in the Trading Post.

Swimming Pool

The Camp Swimming Pool is open from June 1st through August 15th (roughly). It is available later in August or September only when the group desiring to use the pool compensates the camp for the additional costs in maintaining the pool (chemicals).

The pool is primarily used by Summer Camp, and Summer Camp has financial responsibility for the use of the pool. National Youth Leader Training Conferences and Cub Scout Day Camp also use the pool, and the fees for pool use by these groups are included in their course budget. While time available during the summer is extremely limited, other groups wishing to use the pool must complete a camp use permit and pay the appropriate usage fee. The group must have an adult leader trained in *Safe Swim Defense*, must have a person trained in CPR, and must provide adequate lifeguards.

District or Council events, including Summer Camp, must be supervised by a person who holds a current Aquatics Instructor BSA certificate, available only from a BSA National Camping School. Temporary conditional certification can be met by having a person with one of the following certifications: Red Cross Water Safety Instructor; YMCA Water Safety Instructor; Aquatics Instructor, National Intercollegiate Association; and is currently certified in *BSA Safe Swim Defense*. This person must also be currently certified in CPR in basic life support. This is in addition to there being a sufficient number of lifeguards.

All swimming activities at Camp Oyo must meet the standards of Safe Swim Defense, as outlined in the current *Guide to Safe Scouting*. The pool and pool deck are “off limits” when not in official operation.

The Pool Office is a non-sleeping cabin. Its use is for storage (with Camp Operations Director’s permission only) and as a pool office for when the pool is in operation.

Shooting Sports Ranges

Summer Camp has primary budget responsibility for the operation of the ranges. Units or groups wishing to use the rifle range may do so for an additional fee. This fee covers ammunition and equipment rental.

The person supervising the rifle, muzzle-loading or shotgun range must be a BSA certified Shooting Sports Instructor or National Rifle Association (NRA) Instructor, 21 years of age or older. Additional instructors must be at least 18. The person supervising the archery range must be trained and certified by a BSA certified Shooting Sports Instructor or show equivalent training.

The Shooting Sports ranges are available to support instruction in archery, rifle-shooting, shotgun-shooting, and muzzle-loading.

Personal firearms, bows, arrows, and ammunition are not permitted.

Chapel

Camp Oyo has an outdoor Chapel for inspirational use. Units and groups are welcomed and encouraged to use the Chapel. There is no charge to use the Chapel. Check with the Camp Leadership to schedule its use.
